

STUDEBAKER CONNECTION—One Hundred Years—1859 to 1959

As we look back from the year 2009, we note the significance of the last digit '9' in the parallel paths of the Oil industry and the Studebaker

automobile. What coincidences!



Exactly one hundred years

between the first oil well in the United States and the first sensible, successful compact car, the Lark: 1859- Oil gushes out of the first

drilled well near Titusville, Pennsylvania as the Studebaker Brothers start up their newly financed wagon factory in South Bend at the corner of Michigan and Jefferson streets: 1909- Standard Oil of New Jersey is found guilty of violating the Sherman Anti-Trust Act and its giant empire starts to disintegrate as Studebaker prepares to take on Henry Ford's Model 'T' with the new 'Flanders' automobile, named after William Flanders, Studebaker's General Manager, the 'F' in EMF who started out as Henry Ford's production manager. (The 'revolving doors' of the early auto business put our present government-industrial-military complex to shame.)

Oil has seeped out of the ground and into creeks in Pennsylvania since time began. The Seneca Indians of the area skimmed the oil from the creeks and traded it with the Niagra and other tribes for use as a skin ointment. A map of 1748 showed oil springs at Oil City, PA. Salt water wells in the area were constantly polluted by oil that the drillers had no use for.

By 1800, crude oil sold for \$16 per gallon. By 1807, the cost was down to around \$2 due to the excess. The early history of oil was a constant imbalance of production and the search for uses for the stuff. Samuel Keir devised a way to distill crude oil for use in lamps competing with whale oil and a new-fanged product called kerosene, which is made by distilling coal oil. Chemical analysis of the oil from the region showed superior lubricating properties, excellent for the railroad and mechanical industries growing in the area.

This good news prompted land speculation and exploration companies. One such company, the Seneca Oil Company of New Haven, Connecticut sent Edwin Drake out to drill for oil. On August 27th, at 69 1/2


> feet down, he struck oil. It was the first deliberately drilled oil well. Other wells came in during the next few months both in the Pennsylvania fields and others in Ohio, Kentucky and western Virginia. By 1861 the US. annual crude oil production reached over 2 million barrels., and could be bought at the well head for a nickle a barrel.

> Crude oil fires had been a common problem all along, with various creeks and rivers catching fire, so in 1863, the Pennsylvania legislature passed the first anti-pollution bill prohibiting discharge of tar and chemicals into certain creeks and rivers.

> The Studebaker Drivers Club and the Oil Region Alliance both have much to celebrate in their interlocked history. 
